A Panel discussion was held on the topic of Integration and/or Multiculturalism: The major issue of 21st century Europe. The participants also had a chance to visit schools and projects in Wernigerode, Magdeburg and other sites in Saxonia-Anhalt. There were two General Assembly sessions for the members to discuss issues of the organization. It was in these sessions that the decision to hold the next annual congress in Pecs, Hungary was agreed upon.
